

What's the Buzz with Bees?

Entomologist Gaines-Day to speak at Annual Meeting

You're invited to the Friends of the Lakeshore Nature Preserve's Annual Meeting. Hannah Gaines-Day will present on "Native and Managed Pollinators". In this presentation she will discuss the diversity, natural history, and importance of native and managed bee pollinators, review current research being conducted at the University of Wisconsin, and provide guidelines for bee-friendly landscaping. The public is welcome.

The majority of flowering plants depend on pollinators in order to produce seeds and fruit. Bees are the most important of these pollinators and include 20,000 species worldwide. In agricultural landscapes, pollination services are often provided by the non-native, managed honey bee, Apis mellifera. In natural areas, however, pollination is provided by native bees. As honey bees experience population declines, native pollinators are gaining importance for crop production.

In order to survive, bees require food (i.e. flowers), nesting sites, and protection from pesticides. By providing these resources, landowners and farmers are protecting the vital pollination services required for flowering plants and the organisms, including humans, that depend on the fruits provided by these plants.

Learn more about bees and what we can do to provide for them. The meeting starts at 7pm (6:30pm for refreshments) on April 8th at the Arboretum Visitor Center. Bring a friend.

Hannah Gaines-Day has researched bees and pollination in commercial cranberry marshes in Wisconsin. She's studied how the native bee community is influenced by local farm management practices and the surrounding landscape. Gaines-Day has an M.S. in agroecology and entomology, and a PhD in zoology from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She is currently a Research Associate in the Department of Entomology at the UW.



Annual Report

Projects - In the past year, we sponsored several events that helped *Friends* care for and connect to the Preserve and each other. The Frautschi Point planting project in May brought together many *Friends* to usher in spring while planting flowers, telling stories, and enjoying refreshments. Similarly, we celebrated the opening of the the 1918 Marsh Audio Trail by walking together, listening and learning, and a picnic. In 2014, three special *Friends* events are planned for spring, with more in fall, for volunteering, learning, and having fun together.

Support - As always, the *Friends* cared for the Preserve with financial support. Thanks to membership dues and donations, the *Friends* supported five Prairie Partner interns in the Lakeshore Preserve 1.5 days per week under the supervision of Preserve staff. We also contributed to the Preserve Stewardship fund and helped buy plants and seeds for the Preserve. The *Friends* is proud to be an all-volunteer organization - 84% of our expenses went directly to the Preserve. The rest paid for the newsletter, the annual meeting, communication with the membership, and outreach. Another form of support is advocacy for the Preserve. Working last fall with Preserve staff, City and County officials, and the DNR, the *Friends* helped assure that the use of firearms is prohibited in the Preserve and the waters of Lake Mendota. The *Friends* will again have a role as advocates for the Preserve during discussions with UW Recreational Sports on their proposal for extensive development of the University Bay playing fields.

Membership - The *Friends* membership of about 300 reflects the nearly equal number of reasons people connect to the Preserve. Members are in involved in field work, in Board activities and administrative work, and in enjoying the Preserve on regular walks. Among our members are expert bird watchers, artists, and people who provide financial support for the Preserve. Members use the Preserve to conduct research on water quality, plants, birds, mounds, geology, and more. Members use the Preserve as a laboratory to teach students. Some of our members are gardeners in the Community Gardens, joggers along the path, and dog walkers. Members help with prescribed burns in the Preserve, promote the Preserve to students, study mosses or mushrooms or trees. Together, we accomplish much. Our efforts through the *Friends* give us a way we can return, in some small way, what the Preserve provides for us.

The Preserve is a great place for families and groups to spend time together volunteering, learning, and having fun.

Volunteer - In 2013, *Friends* volunteered about 1270 hours of field work, 47% of all volunteer hours given in the Preserve. Our veteran volunteers and Preserve stewards, Roma Lenehan and Glenda Denniston provided the lion's share- Roma logged 464 hours and Glenda more than 450 in special project areas and battling invasives. Other dedicated *Friends* provided 353 hours, mostly working with Preserve staff and alongside 38 other volunteer groups. Many of these were students visiting the Preserve the first time. Volunteers from the *Friends* helped teach them proper use of equipment and plant identification while creating a fun atmosphere. Volunteering is a great way to get to know other Friends while improving the Preserve. It feels good! Education and Community Outreach - Throughout the year, the Friends worked on several levels to connect people to the Preserve- through educational field trips, outreach to the community and students, and through our newsletters and website. The Friends conducted 19 field trips in 2013, drawing more than 250 people to the Preserve. In 2013, Friends took part in several community events. In March we participated in the Eagle Heights Community Garden Seed Fair setting up a hands-on exhibit where children could watch and handle earthworms and make simple seed starting pots using recycled paper tubes. Friends returned to the Eagle Heights Community Center for an Earth Day Celebration with a food chain game and a bucket of garden spades for children to dig for decomposers. At UW Science Expeditions in April, we displayed colorful photographs and information about the Preserve and made the Preserve a destination "Exploration Station" by offering guided tours at Picnic Point. In the heat of August, we joined the student-organized Badger Green Scene- Party on the Path with our new display board and member-led tours along Willow Creek. We were pleased to be able to extend our environmental goodwill beyond the Preserve's boundary. Finally, our enthusiastic newsletter editors, dedicated webmaster, and volunteer coordinator connected members to Preserve activities throughout the year.

Kris Ackerbauer- Kris grew up skiing and canoeing in the Adirondacks. He received a BS in Business at the University of Colorado and an MA from Naval War College. He served 28 years in the USN, flying off Aircraft Carriers deployed around the world, ultimately commanding an A-6 Intruder Squadron on Whidbey Island, Washington, a Naval Air Station in Texas, and the NROTC Unit at UW-Madison. His command won the best recycling program in the entire USN. He has been associated with and supported the Lakeshore Nature Preserve since he was hired as the Assistant Director of the Physical Plant in July 2000.

Patricia Becker - Patricia is a volunteer at the Biocore Prairie Bird Observatory banding station, with a longstanding interest in the preservation of bird habitat and a history of taking part in many national and international trips and workshops for birding. Her interest in conservation is expressed through membership in, volunteering with, and/or participating in field trips with the *Friends* and a number of other local, state, and national conservation groups. She takes pleasure in contributing to the Friends as co-editor of the Friends newsletter. Patricia is an emerita professor in the UW-Madison School of Nursing with a PhD in developmental psychobiology

Susan Carpenter - Susan has been the UW Arboretum native plant gardener for more than 10 years, working with students and volunteers to install and maintain diverse gardens representing native plant communities of Southern Wisconsin. She is involved in native pollinator, especially bumblebee, conservation at the Arboretum and beyond. Her outreach activities include talks, tours, articles, plant identification, teaching gardening practices, and mentoring. Susan also coordinates the Arboretum ranger unit, working with student rangers and volunteer stewards who patrol and maintain trails and educate visitors. She is excited to support the Preserve and help extend educational opportunities for the community.

Margaret (Gretel) Dentine has a Ph. D. in quantitative genetics and is a professor emerita at the UW-Madison. She served 8 years as the Associate Dean for Research in the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences. Gretel currently serves as the registrar for the Eagle Heights Community Gardens (a part of the Lakeshore Preserve). She has done restoration work, threatened species monitoring, and invasive species removal as a volunteer for the Nature Conservancy in Wisconsin and Wyoming, the Ice Age Park and Trail, the National Park Service, and on private property in Wisconsin.

Doris Dubielzig - Doris retired after teaching 8th grade science at Spring Harbor Middle School, where she connected environmental activities at the School Forest and Spring Harbor Park with the writings of Aldo Leopold and John Muir. Since retiring, she mentors new MMSD teachers and has served as a Friendly Observer for UW-Madison students conducting after-school science clubs through the Adult Role Models in Science service learning class. With the McPherson Eye Research Institute Outreach Committee, Doris and her husband have written an extension lesson for MMSD 8th graders that was first implemented by vision scientists in November 2013.

Peter Fisher is a retired naval architect who relocated to Madison 8 years ago. He worked both in the private and public sectors of the marine field. He was a US delegate to the United Nations International Maritime Organization for many years, focusing on the development of ballast water treatment technology to combat invasive marine species. In that vein, since relocating from California Peter has developed a keen interest in the health of Lake Mendota and the Lakeshore Nature Preserve, taking advantage of the departments of limnology and environmental science at UW-Madison. He also heads the Shorewood Hills Community Gardens.

Eric Obscherning - Eric is currently a junior undergraduate studying biology, creative writing, and global health. He spent his Fall 2013 semester in Washington, D.C. interning at The Aspen Institute in the Global Health and Development program, and is currently a Fellow in the Sierra Club's Global Population and Environment program. He looks forward to another terrific spring on the Preserve and working with the *Friends*' Board of directors.

A heartfelt thank you to Friends outgoing board members- Paul Borowsky, Glenda Denniston, Gisela Kutzbach, and Marcia Schmidt. Paul Borowsky, Education Committee Chair, and Preserve stalwart Glenda Denniston are leaving after 3-year terms. Glenda was one of the founding members and has been on the Board for most of the Friends existence - a total of 9 years. Current President, the indefatigable Gisela Kutzbach, has been on the Board for 6 years. Marcia Schmidt has steadfastly been treasurer since 2007. Thank you one and all.

Last October a hunting incident initiated an inquiry into the legality of firearm use in or near the Preserve. Thanks to the actions of Gary Brown (Director of the Preserve), Preserve staff, and the *Friends of the Lakeshore Nature Preserve*, the law is now clear: The use of firearms and other weapons within the Preserve and in the waters of Lake Mendota is prohibited.

The UW-Madison has developed a

new Recreational Sports Master Plan that proposes significant changes to recreational and competitive sports facilities in the West campus. Of particular interest to the *Friends* are proposed changes to the fields at University Bay that include the following features/amenities:

- -Ecofill synthetic turf for some locations (infill made from recycled materials)
- -Lighted outdoor activity spaces
- -Two softball fields and one baseball field
- -Two lacrosse and two rugby fields
- -A soccer/ultimate frisbee field
- -Two picnic shelters with concession windows, storage, and restrooms
- -A 1.5 mile parcourse fitness track
- -Night lighting and speaker systems for the fields.

The UW Facility Planning and Management Division has called for an environmental impact study this spring. The proposed Master Plan can be viewed at http://uwmadison-recsports.wordpress.com/2013/12/16/outdoor-fields-concept-images-revealed/ *Friends* members have been attending meetings and presentations by the Recreational Sports Division and have formed an ad hoc committee to further evaluate the proposal and its potential impacts.
